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In 2024, Arizona passed *Proposition 139*—an extreme amendment that created a "fundamental right to abortion" for every individual. Voters were told it would simply "stop extremist politicians" and put "women and doctors back in charge."

But what *really* happened?

The truth was buried under a flood of misleading ads. The pro-abortion campaign, backed by millions in out-of-state donations, outspent the pro-life opposition by more than **30 to 1**. On Election Day, 61% of voters passed the amendment—many without realizing what it would *actually* do.

Just days after the election was certified:

- Dec 3, 2024: Abortion activists sued to strike down Arizona's 15week abortion limit.
- March 5, 2025: The judge ruled Arizona's abortion limit law unconstitutional.
- May 23, 2025: Abortion activists sued again—this time to eliminate Arizona's 24-hour waiting period and allow abortion pills to be mailed without ever seeing a doctor in person.

And they're just getting started.

Amendment backers told the media they've identified more than 40 abortion laws they plan to challenge—including commonsense protections like:

- Requiring that only doctors perform abortions
- Banning taxpayer funding of abortion
- Requiring parental notice for minors

One extremist group actually publishes a list of these so-called "barriers" on the homepage of its website—saying they're "working to remove these barriers!"

## This is what they do:

Deceive voters. Pass an extreme amendment. Then they systematically dismantle every law that in any way limits abortion—one lawsuit at a time—even if removing these laws harms women by allowing abortions in unsanitary facilities or without proper medical oversight.
